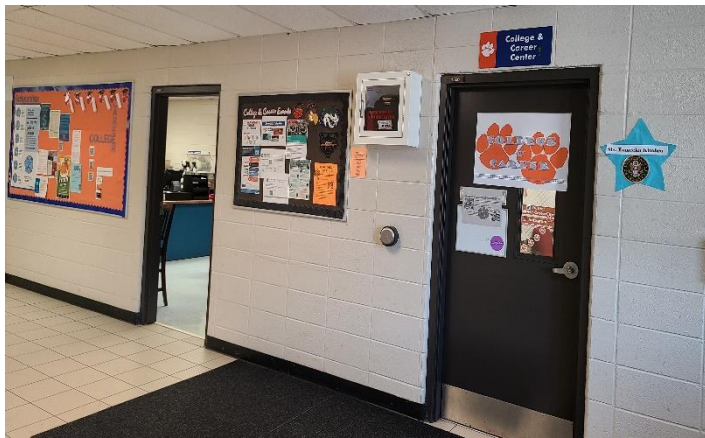

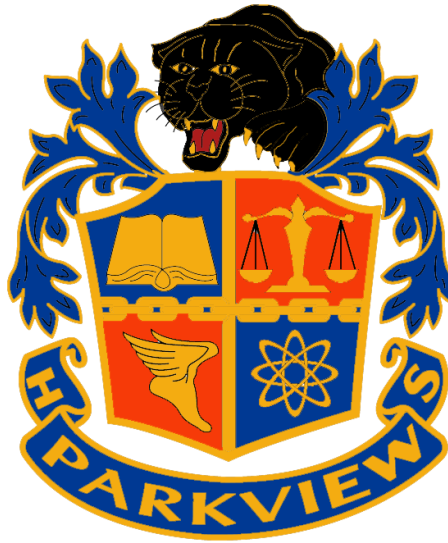

How to Research Information on Colleges of Interest

- Visit the college's website
- Attend College Fairs
- Schedule a campus visit *(or Virtual)*
- In-person visits with college representatives at PHS
- Various websites such as collegescorecard.ed.gov; collegenavigator.ed.gov
- Schedule an appointment with Mrs. Kimbro in the College and Career Center.



Tips for Campus Visits

- Complete a Pre-Arranged Absence Form
– Attendance Office
- Plan in advance. Decide what you want to see and with whom you wish to speak.
- Contact the school in advance for a formal visit.
- Read the college literature.
- Prepare a list of questions and do not be afraid to ask them!
- Take a copy of your high school transcript and SAT/ACT scores.
- Be on time!
- Be yourself.
- Keep a journal of your thoughts and impressions. Feel free to take pictures as well.
- Use a college comparison worksheet to record information.
- Write thank you notes to those who helped you.

The Role of Admissions Tests

Most college in GA may be test-optional
(see individual colleges' website for more information)

- Scholarships may still require test scores (i.e. Zell Miller)
- Depending on Student's GPA may still be required
- How to Request Test Scores
 - Through Registration / Testing Website
- Should students take more than once?
 - Yes
- Are Fee Waivers Available?
 - Fee waivers are available for students who meet specific qualifications.

The Role of Tests in College Applications

- What Are College Admission Tests?
 - SAT/ACT/Accuplacer
- How Do Colleges Use Test Scores?
 - Common Standard
- What Else Do Colleges Consider?
 - Grades, Courses, Extra-Curricular Activities, Recommendation Letters, Essays, Interviews, Community Service
- How Important Are Scores to Colleges?
 - Varies from College to College

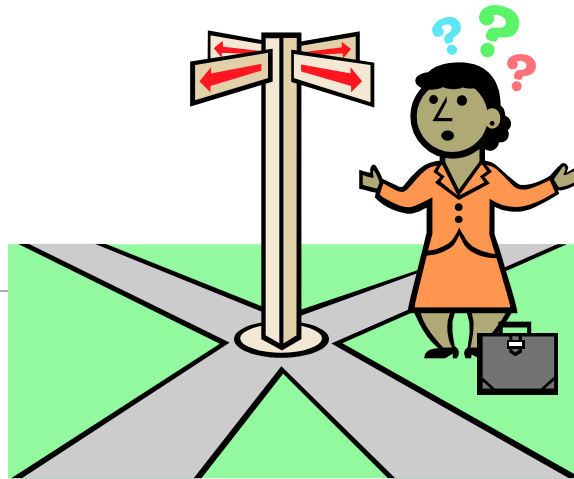

What To Do Next



Encourage Students to Complete Applications

- Complete the applications online
- Read the application directions before starting.
- The applications are a reflection of your student.
- Be thorough
- Use spell check
- Send in before Thanksgiving
- Students do not have to wait on SAT/ACT score to submit applications.
- Make note of all colleges deadlines:
 - Early
 - Regular
 - Scholarships





Applications Where and How Many?

Apply to more than one college

Choose carefully – all colleges require application fees.

- **Reach Schools** – the most selective schools on your list (most likely your first and second choice).
- **Range Schools** – whose numbers (SAT/ACT and GPA) match your numbers. Your chances of being accepted are good but not guaranteed.
- **Safety Schools** – a college that fits your needs. You would be a “shoe-in” of being accepted.

Compile Supplemental Application Materials

- Transcripts
- Test Scores
- Immunization Forms (GA. Colleges)
- Essays
- Recommendations
- Other

Recommendation Letters

- Request for counselor recommendation letters available online and in the Counseling Office
- Encourage students to completed and turn in 1 month before the due date *(we will take it 2 wks before it is due)*

Top 10 Application Mistakes

- Misspellings and Grammatical Errors
- Applying Online – Failure to Submit
- Forgotten Signatures
- Not Reading Carefully
- Listing Extracurricular Activities – Inaccurately
- Not Reviewing the Transcript
- Using Inappropriate Email Addresses
- Not Checking Email regularly
- Letting Someone Else Complete Applications

How to Request Transcripts

From the Counseling Office

- Complete the transcript request form located in the Counseling Office or on MPP.
- There is a \$5.00 fee for each paper transcript request. Can pay in person or through MPP
- Allow a 48 hr. turn around time
- Parkview will mail it to the college (out of state) and/or scholarships as long as the student puts in the correct address in MPP.
- If an electronic copy is needed (i.e. common app) there is only a 1 time \$5 fee.

Electronically (GA Futures)

- Log on to GAfutures.org
- Log into your account
- Click the “College Planning” tab
- Click on “High School Transcript”
- Select “Request Your Transcript”

Transcript requests are released once a week
We must have the student's SS# on file

Transcripts can only be sent to Georgia Colleges for free through GA Futures.

Scholarships: Points to Consider

- Be sure to note eligibility requirements, application procedures, and deadlines.
- Keep grades and test scores (SAT/ACT) up.
- Keep up with deadlines!
- Gather all the information together to be sent in
- Contact colleges and request their scholarship information
- Update the scholarship applications.
- Keep a copy of every application that is submitted.

Georgia Student Finance

HOPE SCHOLARSHIP

Requirements:

- *Must have a 3.0 average from all core classes 9 – 12**

- *Must Have Four Full Academic Credits from Courses Listed on gsfc.org**

(All GCPs students typically already to take these rigor courses)

Benefits:

- *Pays a % of tuition to a Georgia public college**

- *Pays \$2,496 towards tuition to a Georgia private college**

Maintain:

- *3.0 in college**

The amount of the HOPE Scholarship award will adjust annually based on GA Legislature-HOPE Factor Rate. The awards will no longer adjust upward to cover tuition increases, nor do they cover books and fees.

ZELL MILLER SCHOLARSHIP

Requirements:

- *Must have a 3.7 average in all core classes 9 – 12**

AND

- *Have, in one sitting, an SAT of 1200 (CR & M) or an ACT composite score of 26.**

OR

- *Be the class Valedictorian or Salutatorian**

Benefits:

- *Pays full tuition to a Georgia public college**

- *Pays \$2,985 to a Georgia private college**

Maintain:

- *3.3 in college**

Award Charts are available on GAfutures.org

HOPE & Zell Miller Grant

Full-time enrollment is not required and students are not required to graduate from high school with a specific GPA.

Only available for students seeking a certificate or diploma at a branch of the Technical College System of Georgia or a unit of the University System of Georgia

HOPE Grant will pay:

- A percentage amount of the standard tuition charges from the previous year. Students are required to have a postsecondary cumulative 2.0 GPA, at certain checkpoints, in order to maintain eligibility
(similar to HOPE Scholarship the award amount adjust each SY)

Zell Miller Grant will pay:

- Full Tuition, however students must maintain a 3.5 GPA at the end of each term to maintain eligibility. The first term of enrollment will be paid retroactively if the student has the required 3.5 cumulative postsecondary GPA at the end of the term.

HOPE Career Grant

The HOPE Career Grant, is available to HOPE Grant-qualified students who enroll in select majors specifically aligned with one of 18 industries in which there are more jobs available in Georgia than there are skilled workers to fill them. These industries have been identified as strategically important to the state's economic growth.


