# Local School Plan for Improvement (LSPI)

## School: Oakland Meadow School

Accountability and flexibility are hallmarks of Gwinnett County Public Schools' success. Key to that success is ensuring that each school community understands the progress being made by its schools, as well as what plans will drive improvement. Each school creates a collaborative Local School Plan for Improvement (LSPI) to increase student achievement results, with targeted goals based on the four strategic priorities within the district's <u>Blueprint for the Future</u>: *Empathy, Equity, Effectiveness, and Excellence*. All schools across the district will focus on goals **2A- Multi-tiered Systems of Support and 2B- Opportunity and Access.** However, schools are required to select one goal from each of the other strategic priorities for the 2022-2023 school year. LSPI goals are dynamic, like our schools, and are updated to reflect changes that occur in schools. Multiple data points are used to determine areas needing improvement and to identify specific, measurable, annual objectives. Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) are the way we will measure success for each goal. Schools then determine how to use research-based strategies to achieve these goals, using flexibility as needed. The LSPI development process involves teachers, parents, students, and community members, so the entire school community has the opportunity to be involved in conversations about school improvement.

Staff members who serve as mentors to our students have been meeting on a weekly basis to continue their support. Oakland Meadow School now has three Staff Wellness Rooms. Staff members have participated in two "Connect and Engage" events where they shared a meal and participated in social emotional learning activities led by our school social worker. Students in our SID/PID and North Metro Programs participated in social emotional learning activities provided by their classroom teacher and social worker. Our students continue to participate in a club of their choice on a monthly basis. Students, their families, and our staff were invited to attend school wide events such as SEL Bingo Night, International Night, and Donuts with Grown-ups. For example, one of our Vision and Hearing Technicians provided training to the Vision Itinerant teachers about a new assessment tool that is being utilized to conduct vision screenings across the district. The Mentor/Mentee Program continues to provide an opportunity for certified and classified staff members to support new staff members. The Vision Itinerant Mentor Program has engaged in several just in time learning opportunities. These learning opportunities assist our newly appointed vision teachers with the skills necessary to support students across the district.         Implementation Design Next Steps:         Teachers, paraprofessionals, and staff will continue to be encouraged to take on leadership roles at Oakland Meadow School and within the district. All staff have completed their placement preference form which includes a section where staff can indicate if they would like to take on leadership roles and responsibilities for the next school year. #### **Implementation Design Progress:**

Oakland Meadow School has supported two way transparent communication with all stakeholders through our website, parent newsletter, Local School Council meetings, event flyers, parent phone calls and emails as well as Messenger messages. We have increased our followers on Instagram from 8 to 67 and our followers on Facebook from 36 to 98. Our classroom teachers at Oakland Meadow have ensured communication with their families through daily communication sheets, their eClass pages, emails, phone calls, conferences, and meetings. Our social worker has hosted two Transitioning Parent Network Meetings to support the needs of our students and their families.
